Today's Daily Prayer – God gives us gifts and talents to be used, not hidden away

Background to the Gospel

When Jesus was teaching the people, he would often use the literary device of the parable. A parable takes an image from the visible world (which the people would be familiar with) and uses it to teach something from the spiritual world. In other words, it is an earthly story with a heavenly meaning. In the parable of the talents (a talent being a great amount of money – equivalent to 15 years wages), Jesus portrays God as a businessman who demands that his employees use their skills, knowledge and talents to do the best with what they have been given.

Listen

Reader: A reading from the holy Gospel according to Matthew.

Jesus spoke this parable to his disciples:

'The kingdom of heaven is like a man on his way abroad who summoned his servants and entrusted his property to them. To one he gave five talents, to another two, to a third one; each in proportion to his ability. Then he set out.

The man who had received the five talents promptly went and traded with them and made five more. The man who had received two made two more in the same way. But the man who had received one went off and dug a hole in the ground and hid his master's money.

Now a long time after, the master of those servants came back and went through his accounts with them. The man who had received the five talents came forward bringing five more. "Sir", he said "you entrusted me with five talents; here are five more that I have made." His master said to him, "Well done, good and faithful servant; you have shown you can be faithful in small things, I will trust you with greater; come and join in your master's happiness."

Next the man with the two talents came forward. "Sir," he said, "you entrusted me with two talents; here are two more that I have made." His master said to him, "Well done, good and faithful servant; you have shown you can be faithful in small things, I will trust you with greater; come and join in your master's happiness."

Last came forward the man who had the one talent. "Sir," said he "I had heard you were a hard man, reaping where you have not sown and gathering where you have not scattered; so I was afraid, and I went off and hid your talent in the ground. Here it is; it was yours, you have it back." But his master answered him, "You wicked and lazy servant! So you knew that I reap where I have not sown and gather where I have not scattered? Well then, you should have deposited my money with the bankers, and on my return I would have recovered my capital with interest.

So now, take the talent from him and give it to the man who has the five talents. For to everyone who has will be given more, and he will have more than enough; but from the man who has not, even what he has will be taken away. As for this good-for-nothing servant, throw him out into the dark, where there will be weeping and grinding of teeth."

(Pause)

Leader: I invite you to sit quietly and close your eyes. (*Pause*)

Imagine that God comes to you at the end of your life and asks you what you have done with the gifts and talents he has given you.

He asks you how you have used your gifts to make the world a better place.

What would your answer be?

Background to the Responsorial Psalm

This psalm would be prayed over a pilgrim who came to the temple to offer sacrifice. The mark of a prosperous man was someone who had a faithful, loving and fruitful wife and many children to increase his wealth. The psalmist uses two images from the culture of the time – the vine to represent the fruitful wife and the olive trees to characterise his productive offspring. The phrase 'fear the Lord' means to be in awe of, to respect and honour.

Listen

Leader: Let us pray the Responsorial Psalm.

Reader: Blessed are those who fear the Lord.

All: Blessed are those who fear the Lord.

Reader: Blessed are you who fear the Lord,

who walk in his ways!

For you shall eat the fruit of your handiwork;

blessed shall you be and favoured.

Background to the First Reading

In ancient times, women were possessions owned by men and married for status, power or wealth. A woman had no voice, no authority, no standing in her community. Her role and expectations were very clear: to care for her husband and his household and to bear him many children, a sign of God's love. In this reading, we read the description of a wise and faithful wife, one who is valued more than precious pearls, a woman whose husband is proud of her and praises and respects her.

Listen

If possible, the scripture passage is to be read from a lectionary or a bible, which could be put in an honoured place. Readers are to read slowly and clearly when proclaiming the Word of God, and treat the text with reverence.

Leader: Let us listen attentively to the First Reading.

Reader: A reading from the Book of Proverbs.

When one finds a worthy wife,

Background to the Second Reading

In the early days of the Church, many Christians were overly concerned about Jesus' return as they thought it was imminent. In this reading (and in many of Jesus' teachings), Paul says not to worry about that, but to concentrate on living good lives. We do not know when Jesus will return, as he will come like a thief in the night when we least expect him. So we must always be prepared and live as if he were coming now.

Listen

Leader: Let us listen to this reading from Paul's letter to the Thessalonians.

Reader: Concerning times and seasons, brothers and sisters, you have no need for anything to be written to you. For you yourselves know very well that the day of the Lord will come like a thief at night. When people are saying, 'Peace and security', then sudden disaster comes

upon them, like labour pains upon a pregnant woman, and they will not escape.

But you, brothers and sisters, are not in darkness, for that day to overtake you like a thief. For all of you are children of the light and children of the day. We are not of the night or of darkness. Therefore, let us not sleep as the rest do, but let us stay alert and sober.

(Pause)

This is the Word of the Lord.

All: Thanks be to God.

Respond

Prayers of the Faithful

Leader: Let us pray, O Lord, knowing that you always listen to our prayers.

Reader: For the wisdom to know you in many different ways: (Pause) O Lord, we pray.

The sections highlighted can be used for a shorter version of the Gospel.

ability. Then he went away.

Immediately the one who received five talents went and traded with them, and made another five. Likewise, the one who received two made another two. But the man who received one went off and dug a hole in the ground and buried his master's money.

After a long time the master of those servants came back and settled accounts with them. The one who had received five talents came forward bringing the additional five. He said, "Master, you gave me five talents. See, I have made five more." His master said to him, "Well done, my good and faithful servant. Since you were faithful in small matters, I will give you great responsibilities. Come, share your master's joy."

Then the one who had received two talents also came forward and said, "Master, you gave me two talents. See, I have made two more." His master said to him, "Well done, my good and faithful servant. Since you were faithful in small matters, I will give you great responsibilities. Come, share your master's joy."

Then the one who had received the one talent came forward and said, "Master, I knew you were a demanding person, harvesting where you did not plant and gathering where you did not scatter; so out of fear I went off and buried your talent in the ground. Here it is back." His master said to him in reply, "You wicked, lazy servant! So you knew that I harvest where I did not plant and gather where I did not scatter? Should you not then have put my money in the bank so that I could have got it back with interest on my return?

Now then! Take the talent from him and give it to the one with ten. For to everyone who has, more will be given and he will grow rich; but from the one who has not, even what he has will be taken away. And throw this useless servant into the darkness outside, where there will be wailing and grinding of teeth."

(Pause)

Leader:
