Year of Prayer 2024

Pope Francis proposed that 2024 be marked as a year dedicated to prayer in preparation for the Jubilee 2025. The Melbourne Archdiocese Catholic Schools (MACS) Daily Prayer resources will support both individual and community prayer in the Year of Prayer 2024. In addition, the Dicastery for Evangelization will publish a series of prayer notebooks, with material taken from the many forms of prayer to be found in the rich Catholic tradition.

Preparations for Daily Prayer

The following daily prayers can be used in their entirety or adapted to meet the needs of the audience. The prayers draw on the Sunday readings, so you may use any of the prayers on any day, although special focus will be given to Feast days, Solemnities and days of cultural significance. Feel free to adapt the prayers for special occasions or specific intentions of your own class and school.

The prayers will introduce students to traditional prayer and liturgical practices and responses, as well as a variety of Christian spiritual experiences. Take the opportunity to create a **sacred space** for prayer as you might do in creating a protected garden. This may include a prayer cloth or placemat, a bible, a candle and flowers. Additional resources (apps, websites, music, videos) will be suggested for those wanting to enrich the prayers or to understand the readings at a deeper level.

The optional shorter prayer of the day is indicated by green headings on each day.

Monday

Background to the First Reading

The word Pentecost means 'fifty' and refers to the ancient feast of the Grain Harvest, which occurred 50 days after Passover. It was also a pilgrimage feast, which explained why there were so many people in Jerusalem at this time from other parts of the world. There is much imagery in the wind and the fire. Many ancient people believed that the winds were God's breath and, by breathing, God gave everything life. When the wind appeared at Pentecost, God was breathing his life into the apostles. Fire also speaks of the presence of God, as seen often in the Old Testament. The fire was in the form of tongues, implying that the apostles were being given the power and the gift to speak in the name of God and proclaim Jesus' message.



Listen

Leader: Let us prepare to listen attentively to the sacred words of Scripture.

Reader: A reading from the Acts of the Apostles.

When Pentecost day came round, the apostles had all met in one room, when suddenly they heard what sounded like a powerful wind from heaven, the noise of which filled the entire house in which they were sitting; and something appeared to them that seemed like tongues of fire; these separated and came to rest on the head of each of them. They were all filled with the Holy Spirit, and began to speak foreign languages as the Spirit gave them the gift of speech.

Now there were devout men living in Jerusalem from every nation under heaven, and at this sound they all assembled, each one bewildered to hear these men speaking his own language. They were amazed and astonished. 'Surely' they said 'all these men speaking are Galileans? How does it happen that each of us hears them in his own native language? Parthians, Medes and Elamites; people from Mesopotamia, Judaea and Cappadocia, Pontus and Asia, Phrygia and Pamphylia, Egypt and the parts of Libya round Cyrene; as well as visitors from Rome – Jews and proselytes alike – Cretans and Arabs; we hear them preaching in our own language about the marvels of God.'

All: Thanks be to God.

Background to the Second Reading

This reading is from Saint Paul's first letter to the community at Corinth. A Greek city, Corinth was situated on a narrow piece of land that separated upper and lower Greece. It was well placed as a centre of trade and commerce because of its position, and was a very diverse city in terms of population, culture and beliefs. Although people from many countries lived there, the overriding culture was Greek. Paul found it difficult to translate Jewish thinking and culture into concepts that the Greeks would understand and accept. They particularly struggled with the notion of resurrection.



Listen

If possible, the scripture passage is to be read from a lectionary or a bible, which could be put in an honoured place. Readers are to read slowly and clearly when proclaiming the Word of God, and treat the text with reverence.

Leader: Let us listen attentively to sacred Scripture.

Reader: Brothers and sisters:

No one can say, 'Jesus is Lord', except by the Holy Spirit.

There are different kinds of spiritual gifts but the same Spirit;

there are different forms of service but the same Lord;

there are different workings but the same God

who produces all of them in everyone.

To each individual the manifestation of the Spirit

is given for some benefit.

As a body is one though it has many parts,

and all the parts of the body, though many, are one body,

so also Christ.

For in one Spirit we were all baptised into one body,

whether Jews or Greeks, slaves or free persons,

and we were all given to drink of one Spirit.

(Pause)

The Word of the Lord.

All: Thanks be to God.

Respond

Leader:

Saint Paul speaks of the gifts of the Holy Spirit that have been given to each person. Not everyone has the same gifts – they are many and varied, but he points out that each person has gifts. The gifts are not to be used to promote oneself, but in service of others. Let us take some time to reflect on his message.

How is the Spirit alive in me in my life?

What gifts do I have that I could share with this community?

How do I show that I value the gifts of others?

Time for quiet reflection ...

Background to the Gospel

Ancient people believed that breath was the result of an inner power, one's life force, which came from God. The word for 'Spirit' in both Greek and Hebrew was the same for breath or wind. When Jesus breathed on his apostles, he gave them God's power, life and spirit. With the receiving of the Spirit, they had the authority to speak and act in the name of Jesus. In this Gospel, Jesus commissions his apostles and breathes on them, filling them with the Holy Spirit. His mission, their mission and our mission are one and the same.

Listen

Leader: Let us prepare to listen attentively to the sacred words of Scripture.

Reader: On the evening of that first day of the week,

when the doors were locked, where the disciples were,

for fear of the Jews.

Jesus came and stood in their midst and said to them, 'Peace be with you.'

When he had said this, he showed them his hands and his side.

The disciples rejoiced when they saw the Lord.

Jesus said to them again, 'Peace be with you.

As the Father has sent me, so I send you.'

And when he had said this, he breathed on them and said to them,

'Receive the Holy Spirit.

Whose sins you forgive are forgiven them, and whose sins you retain are retained.'

Take a few slow, deep breaths to help us attend to this moment. There may be special occasions or specific intentions that those gathered want to include in today's prayer. Sound a singing bowl, a bell or a chime to begin.

Leader: As we gather together in God's presence, let us make the Sign of the Cross reverently

and mindfully.

All: In the name of the Father (pause), and of the Son (pause), and of the Holy Spirit

(pause). Amen.

Light candle and pause.

Leader: Let us pray the Opening Prayer from the Mass of Our Lady, Help of Christians.

Almighty and ever-living God, who placed the love of Our Lady, Help of Christians, in the hearts of those who brought the Catholic faith to these shores, grant through her intercession, wisdom to our leaders and integrity to our citizens, so that, under her protection, Australia may know harmony, justice and peace. Background to the feast of Mary, Help of Christians

Mary, Help of Christians, is a title that was established in 1814 in thanksgiving for the release of Pius VII from captivity. The first provincial synod in Australia in 1844 placed the Church under the patronage of Mary, invoked by the title 'Help of Christians'. This feast is an opportunity to ask for Mary's help and protection for the Church and for the nation.

Listen

Leader: Let us prepare to listen attentively to the sacred words of Scripture.

Reader: In those days Mary set out and went with haste to a Judean town in the hill country,

where she entered the house of Zechariah and greeted Elizabeth. When Elizabeth heard Mary's greeting, the child leaped in her womb. And Elizabeth was filled with the Holy Spirit and exclaimed with a loud cry, 'Blessed are you among women, and blessed is the fruit of your womb. And why has this happened to me, that the mother of my Lord comes to me? For as soon as I heard the sound of your greeting, the child in my womb leaped for joy. And blessed is she who believed that there would be a fulfillment of what was

spoken to her by the Lord.'

(Pause)

The Gospel of the Lord.

All: Praise to you, Lord Jesus Christ.

Respond

Litany to Mary

Leader: Holy Mary, model of faithfulness,

All: Pray for us.

Leader: Holy Mother of God, mother of us all,

All: Pray for us.

Leader: Mother of Christ, strong and constant,

All: Pray for us.

Leader: Mother of the Church, interceding for us,

All: Pray for us.

Leader: Mother most pure, model of wisdom,

All: Pray for us.

Leader: Woman of sacrifice, loving and true,

All: Pray for us.

Leader: Woman of courage, brave and determined,

All: Pray for us.

Leader: Woman of love, trusting and hope-filled,

All: Pray for us.

Leader: Queen of angels, queen of peace,

All: Pray for us.

Leader: Help of Christians, protector of our land,

All: Pray for us.
