

# Daily Prayer

Twenty-ninth Sunday in Ordinary Time Year B  
The Year of Mark; Year of Prayer 2024



**Readings:** Isaiah 53: 10–11; Psalm 32: 4–5, 18–20, 22; Hebrews 4: 14–16; Mark 10: 42–45.

## Year of Prayer 2024

Pope Francis proposed that 2024 be marked as a year dedicated to prayer in preparation for the Jubilee 2025. The Melbourne Archdiocese Catholic Schools (MACS) Daily Prayer resources will support both individual and community prayer in the Year of Prayer 2024. In addition, the Dicastery for Evangelization will publish a series of [prayer notebooks](#), with material taken from the many forms of prayer to be found in the rich Catholic tradition.

## Preparations for Daily Prayer

The following daily prayers can be used in their entirety or adapted to meet the needs of the audience. The prayers draw on the Sunday readings, so you may use any of the prayers on any day, although special focus will be given to Feast days, Solemnities and days of special cultural significance. Feel free to adapt the prayers for special occasions or specific intentions of your own class and school.

The prayers will introduce students to traditional prayer and liturgical practices and responses, as well as a variety of Christian spiritual experiences. Take the opportunity to create a **Sacred Space** for prayer as you might do in creating a protected garden. This may include a prayer cloth or placemat, a bible, a candle and flowers. Additional resources (apps, websites, music, videos) will be suggested for those wanting to enrich the prayers or to understand the readings at a deeper level.

## Readings this week

This week's readings are about the price of discipleship. In the First Reading it is the image of the suffering servant who metaphorically takes on the sins of the whole community. In the Gospel, Jesus explains the kingdom of God is about servant leadership. Fortunately, the psalm and the second reading assure us that if we take on that role, we will never be alone – God is faithful to those who revere him.

Today we will focus on the First Reading of Sunday. **Preparation:** Choose readers and someone to light the candle.

## Monday

### Gather

*Remind those present to turn phones to silent, close computer screens, sit quietly and prepare for prayer by becoming aware of God present in the word, in each other and in ourselves. Take a few slow, deep breaths to help us attend to this moment. There may be special occasions or specific intentions that those gathered may wish to include in today's prayer. Sound a singing bowl, a bell or a chime to begin.*

#### The Sign of the Cross

**Leader:** As we gather together in God's presence, let us make the Sign of the Cross reverently and mindfully.

**All:** **In the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit. Amen.**

*Light candle and pause.*

**Leader:** We light this candle and pray that our hearts are open to God's will in our lives.

**All:** **Amen.**

### Background to the First Reading

*This reading from the prophet Isaiah was probably written at the end of the Babylonian exile and speaks of a suffering servant who takes upon himself the suffering of many for the good of the whole community. Although Isaiah never names the servant, it is possibly a figure who lived in the Exile and metaphorically carried Israel's suffering. The Israelites in captivity were broken and beaten down but hoped that one day they would be raised up. The servant embodied this feeling. As Christians we can see many parallels with the person of Christ and readings from Isaiah are used during the Holy Week liturgies.*

### Listen

*If possible, the scripture passage is to be read from a lectionary or a bible, which could be put in an honoured place. Readers are to read slowly and clearly when proclaiming the word of God and treat the text with reverence.*

**Leader:** Let us prepare to listen attentively to the sacred words of Scripture.

## Tuesday

### The Sign of the Cross

**All:** **In the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit. Amen.**

**Leader:** As we light this candle, we praise you, God, for who you are, not for what you can do. We place our trust in you and believe in your everlasting love and mercy.

**All:** **Amen.**

### Background to the Responsorial Psalm

*This psalm is a hymn of praise beginning with praising God for who God is, not for what God has done. God is all-powerful and all-loving, and his word is faithful and true, just and right. The psalm then goes on to describe all that God has done in creating the world. It describes how God blessed those who remained faithful to him. It concludes with a blessing on all those who remained in covenant with God and continued to have hope and trust.*

## Listen

**Leader:** Let us pray together the Responsorial Psalm.

**Reader:** The word of the Lord is faithful  
and all his works to be trusted.

The Lord loves justice and right  
and fills the earth with his love.

to rescue their souls from death,

**All:** **Lord, let your mercy be on us, as we place our trust in you.**

## Respond

**Leader:** I invite you to re-read the psalm and find the words that speak most clearly to you.  
(*Pause*)

Each person present is invited to say those words out loud and we will pause between each one and respond with these words: **The Lord is kind and merciful.**

## Go Forth

**Leader:** Let us go forth from here remembering that we can place our trust in God – a God who is filled with justice, mercy and compassion.

**All:** **Amen.**

**Leader:** Let us go forth from here praising God in all that we do and say.

**All:** **Inspired to live faithfully in the light of Christ.**

*Extinguish candles and pause.*

**All:** **In the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit. Amen.**

## Wednesday

### Gather

Take a few slow, deep breaths to help us attend to this moment. There may be special occasions or specific intentions that those gathered may wish to include in today's prayer. Sound a singing bowl, a bell or a chime to begin.*

#### **The Sign of the Cross**

**Leader:** As we gather together in God's presence, let us make the Sign of the Cross reverently and mindfully.

**All:** **In the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit. Amen.**

### **Background to the Second Reading**

*A very important part of Jewish life would be going to the Temple to offer sacrifice. The gifts that the worshipper would bring could include sheep, goats, doves and the offerings of wheat or the first fruits of the harvest. They would offer them in thanks or to seek forgiveness for sins. The High Priest, the one who would do the sacrificing on behalf of a person, would be well known. This type of sacrificing was also common in Roman and Greek cultures.*

### **Listen**

*If possible, the scripture passage is to be read from a lectionary or a bible, which could be put in an honoured place. Readers are to read slowly and clearly when proclaiming the word of God and treat the text with reverence.*

**Leader:** Let us prepare to listen attentively to the sacred words of Scripture.

**Reader:** **A reading from the letter to the Hebrews.**

Since in Jesus, the Son of God, we have the supreme high priest who has gone through to the highest heaven, we must never let go of the faith that we have professed. For it is not as if we had a high priest who was incapable of feeling our weaknesses with us; but we have one who has been tempted in every way that we are, though he is without sin.



Let us be confident, then, in approaching the throne of grace, that we shall have mercy from him and find grace when we are in need of help.

**ALL: Thanks be to God**

## Respond

**Leader:** When talking about his creative writing, the Pakistani novelist Mohsin Hamid said, 'Empathy is about finding echoes of another person in yourself'. In this reading, we are reminded that because God became human in the person of Jesus, we can confidently approach him, as he can understand and empathise with us. Just like a true and loyal friend we can pour out our hearts to Jesus and know that he listens with love and kindness. Let us take some time to reflect on this.

*Time for quiet reflection.*

## Go Forth

**Leader:** Let us pray this prayer together.

**All:** **Loving God, may I trust that you are with me**  
**in all my trials and sufferings,**  
**in my joys and triumphs,**

### Background to the Gospel

*At the time of Jesus, Israel was occupied by the forces of Rome and they were deeply despised by the population. Many dreamed of a day when the Romans would be overthrown, and the Israelites would take back their land. When Jesus speaks of the coming of the kingdom, his followers believe he is talking of such a revolution and James and John want to get in early to book their places to share in the power and glory. But Jesus tells them that great leaders are firstly great servants.*

### Listen

*If possible, the scripture passage is to be read from a lectionary or a bible, which could be put in an honoured place. Readers are to read slowly and clearly when proclaiming the word of God and treat the text with reverence.*

**Leader:** Let us prepare to listen attentively to the sacred words of Scripture, today's reading is from Sunday's Gospel, the Gospel of Mark.

**All:** **Alleluia, alleluia!**

The Son of Man came to serve

and to give his life as a ransom for all.

**Alleluia!**

2. Are there areas where you struggle to embrace this call to servanthood?
3. What steps can you take to align more closely with this teaching?

Share your reflections with the person sitting next to you.

You came not to be served but to serve, teach me the true meaning of greatness. Help me to humble myself, to put others before me and to lead with a heart of a servant.
